Find Your Interest

What type of work do you want to do?

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Project types could include residential, commercial, mixed-use, hospitality, healthcare, and so on. Some firms offer more hands-on and detail oriented experiences, while others focus on the larger picture - masterplanning and community development. What would excite you to come into work every day?



The Scale of Your Environment

Are you looking for a small office, or a big one?

Understand how architecture offices work so you can understand how you can be valuable. Typically, larger offices would hire you to be a part of a team - they would be looking for someone to fulfill a specific function. Smaller firms have more opportunities for variety as you might be doing many different things at the same time. Both have great capacity for learning experience. Office culture is also very important!

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Job interviews can be nerve-wracking. Try and set up as many as you can, even if a firm might not be your first choice. You gain immense experience going through the process, and it helps to familiarize yourself with the types of questions you will be asked, and the types of interviewers. Know how to present your portfolio, and know what types of questions to ask back to them. You are interviewing them just as much as they are interviewing you!

Know Your Worth

You get one shot; make it good.

You are making a long-term commitment by joining a firm; as such both parties have to be satisfied with what is on the table. Your portfolio will only get you so far, but the rest is based on communication skills. Know what you have to offer, and where you have room for improvement. Know your numbers salary-wise (NO unpaid internships), and inquire about hours and workloads. Always follow up with a thank you email or note, no matter how it goes.



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Don't Give Up!

The perfect fit is out there for you.

Fact: it is going to take time and effort to find a job. You have to trust in your skills, abilities, and 'brand' that you put out into the world. Find ways to network and attend events. Follow up with interviewers and keep searching for new opportunities on a daily basis. There are plenty of opportunities available and it will be a matter of time until you nail one.

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The existing building was being refurbished and renovated; as such the building was scanned and the resulting point clouds, along with reference photos taken on multiple site visits, were used to model the structure and immediate site context in Revit. Some elements that were worked on were the dining/office as-built on the first floor, special modeling of items in the foyer, multiple floors of residential rooms with custom door trims, and basement/back of house elements, as well as the custom historical fire escapes that needed to be preserved.





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The existing hotel complex was scanned and converted to point cloud imagery in order for it to be modeled in Revit. Attention was paid to complex details that needed to be modeled such as the custom railings that were on every floor, as well as the unique trusswork for the atrium root. The hotel units were also drawn and modeled in accordance with the point cloud measurements and reference photos.

PREPARATION IS KEY

- AAU International Advisors are a great resource use them!
- · Plan ahead know your timelines, have an estimate of how long things will take
- · Understand STEM criteria, requirements, opportunities
- It would be beneficial to find an employer who is enrolled in USCIS E-Verify
- If you are considering H1B sponsorship, inquire about it early; reach out to legal aid if needed
